

Aoi Aso Jinja Shrine

Kumamoto Prefecture's first National Treasure

This shrine is affectionately known by locals as "Aoi-san." The present complex of shrine buildings, which took four years to construct starting in 1610, is a priceless architectural work which has survived for over 400 years. The shrine was designated as a National Treasure in 2008.

Aoi Shrine Grove / National Treasure Memorial Hall

Designed by the architect Kengo Kuma, this facility was built to commemorate the 10th anniversary of Aoi Aso Jinia Shrine being designated as a National Treasure. Exhibits at the hall include holy goshinto and honotoken swords, which were restored after being damaged during torrential rains in 2020.




Hitoyoshi Castle Ruins

One of the 100 Fine Castles of Japan and residence of the Sagara clan

Also known as "Crescent Moon Castle," Hitoyoshi Castle is the former home of the Sagara clan, who ruled the Hitoyoshi Kuma region for around 700 years.

With its authentic construction, the castle dates back to the Warring States period of Japanese history, and its present form was conceived in the era of Sagara Nagatsune, the 20th head of the Sagara clan.

Kijiuma



An interactive theme park for experiencing the culture of Hitoyoshi

This attraction enables visitors to create their own handicrafts and features exhibits of traditional artifacts and toys from the Hitoyoshi Kuma region. It includes six different plazas both large and small, and is popular as a destination for family days out. There are also a souvenir store and a campground.

Kijiuma are traditional Japanese toys which are cute and have a subtle charm. Kijiuma and Kijiguruma used to be made all over Kyushu. With a decline in the number of craftspeople, the method for producing these toys is seen as an aspect of Japanese culture that should be cherished, and was chosen as an Important Intangible Folk Cultural Property of Japan in January 2025. The colors and shapes of kijiuma vary depending on the region in which they are made, and with two wheels and no saddle, kijiuma from Hitoyoshi Kuma are

relatively simple, although they are also decorated in vibrant colors.



Eikokuji Temple



This temple belongs to the Soto school of Zen Buddhism and is also known as the "Temple of Ghosts." In it there is a hanging scroll that depicts a ghost-like figure thought to have been drawn by the founder of the temple, Jitteichoshin Osho.

Sekisuiji Temple



This temple is famous for its main gate, which is made from a large, round, hollowed-out rock. In the grounds are Megane-bashi Bridge (literally "eyeglasses bridge") and a natural spring. Among the artifacts in the temple's collection are lithographs of the sixteen disciples of Buddha who attained Nirvana and a hanging scroll of the Ten Kings of Hell.


Sagara 33 Kannon

Enter the world of prayer on a tour of pilgrimage sites

There are 35 pilgrimage sites dedicated to Kannon (the Buddhist deity of compassion) in Hitoyoshi Kuma, each of which grants its own unique blessing, and their statues of Kannon are unveiled during the spring and fall equinoxes.

The picture on the right shows a statue of the thousand-armed Kannon at the 9th pilgrimage site, Murayama Kannon Hall.





Kumagawa Rail Yunomae Line

Traveling through the countryside

This railway line runs between Hitoyoshi and the town of Yunomae. Along the way it passes through beautiful countryside.

Karakuri Clock

This clock features mechanical dolls and was inspired by Hitoyoshi Castle and the surrounding town. It operates every hour on the hour from 9:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. (5:00 p.m. in winter)

Hitoyoshi Engine Shed

This is the only stone-built engine shed in Japan that is still in use. Its appearance has remained unaltered since the Meiji era.

Situated next to JR Hitovoshi Station, this museum conveys the history and appeal of the Hisatsu Line. Visitors can enjoy everything from a mini-train to rail bikes, dioramas, and videos.

Unsun Karuta

The card game Unsun Karuta was originally based on the Portuguese Namban Carta, which was introduced to Japan in the mid-16th century. There is a store on Kajiyamachi-dori called *Unsun* Karuta no le ("the house of Unsun Karuta") where visitors can learn about this traditional game.

In an era when the Sagara clan ruled Hitoyoshi Kuma, this street was lined with

blacksmith's stores, and is still characterized by its charming paving stones. As well as restaurants and distilleries, its many attractions include the tea factory and shop Cha no Kura (Tateyama Sho-Ten) and the Miso and Soy Sauce Factory (Kamada Shoyury).

In winter you can travel by kotatsubune. These boats have low wooden tables fitted with charcoal burners, beneath which passengers keep warm by covering their legs with duvet-style futons.

Each raft is captained by a skilled river guide and everyone from families to senior citizens can safely participate.

This is the departure point for Kumagawa Kudari pleasure boats. It has an open terrace overlooking Hitoyoshi Castle Ruins. As well as the reception desk for Kumagawa Kudari and white-water rafting, HASSENBA features a store selling local products, a café, and more.

Sengetsu Shuzo Sengetsu Shiromigura



This distillery was founded over 120 years ago. It is open to the public all year round and visitors can observe the *shochu*-making process. Including products available only at the distillery, Sengetsu has a lineup of around 30 *shochu* brands that visitors can taste before they buy. There is also a panoramic view of Hitoyoshi, including the castle ruins and the Kuma River.

Kuma shochu has a 500-year history. It is defined as a bottled alcoholic beverage with domestically produced rice as its base ingredient, distilled in Hitoyoshi Kuma from moromi (fermentation mash) prepared using water from the region. There are two distillation methods, atmospheric distillation and reduced pressure distillation. In 1995, Kuma shochu was also recognized by the World Trade Organization (WTO) as having geographical indication of the place of origin.





The distilleries have a timeless charm in which brick chimneys and the like can still be seen.

Hitoyoshi: The Home of Onsen

Hitovoshi's onsen (hot springs) have a long history, and there is a record of Tametsugu, the 12th head of the Sagara clan, taking a hot-spring cure in 1492. Many onsen can be found beside the Kuma River, and there are more than 50 sources of natural hot spring water in Hitoyoshi as a whole. As well as traditional Japanese inns with bathing facilities, there are 20 onsen open to the general public, and onsen are an important tourist resource for the city. They are also popular as a beauty treatment.
